Continuing Exhibitions

Manet: Portraying Life

Through Jan. 1, 2013, Canaday Gallery

It's the last day (Jan. 1, 2013) to see this major international exhibition in the United States. Co-organized by the Royal Academy of Arts, London, and the Toledo Museum of Art, the exhibition is the first to focus exclusively on the portraiture of Édouard Manet (French, 1832–1883). Admission is \$8 for adults, \$5 for seniors (ages 65 and older) and students (ages 6–22). Admission is free for Toledo Museum of Art members. Leslie Adams: Drawn from Life

Through Jan. 13, 2013, Gallery 18

As a young girl Leslie Adams attended art classes at the Toledo Museum of Art. Today she is nationally known for her portraits of distinguished members of society and civic leaders. The first recipient of the Solo Exhibition Award of the *Toledo Area Artists Exhibition* in 2011, Adams presents a new body of approximately 20 works incorporating Old Master painting compositions and drawing techniques. This work is autobiographical, weaving classical references with a dash of 20th-century pop culture. In it Adams conveys memories of TMA and its collection together with other people, places and objects that have shaped her career and life. Free admission.

Prints and Authors from the Time of Manet

Through Jan. 13, 2013, Works on Paper Gallery

Édouard Manet (1832–1883) came of age during a time of prolific change in Paris and in French society in general. Prints, photographs and illustrated books are included in this exhibition of artworks produced during Manet's lifetime. More than 120 works by some of the most talented artists working in the period—including Renoir, Corot, Daumier, Whistler, and Manet himself—are featured. Free admission.

Made in Hollywood: Photographs from the John Kobal Foundation

Through Jan. 20, 2013, Galleries 4, 5, 9

From the silent era through the end of the studio system in the late 1950s, these camera artists captured and created the magic that Hollywood symbolized. Featuring more than 90 images, *Made in Hollywood* offers a glimpse into the world of fantasy, glamour and perfection that the image makers produced—images that have ensured their names are included in the pantheon of fine art photography. Toledo is the final stop for this traveling exhibition of vintage prints organized by the Santa Barbara Museum of Art. Admission is \$8 for adults, \$5 for seniors (ages 65 and older) and students (ages 6–22). Admission is free for Toledo Museum of Art members. The exhibition is sponsored in part by Taylor Cadillac. A companion book, *Glamour of the Gods*, is available through the Museum Store.

Museum People: Faces of TMA

Through Jan. 20, 2013, Gallery 1

Museum people—those who visit and support the art institutions—come from all walks of life. Last spring, hundreds of Toledo Museum of Art community members of all ages stopped by to have photo headshots taken to be included in this exhibition featuring a sea of more than 600 faces. The collective community portrait is shown from floor-to-ceiling “salon style” adjacent to the *Manet: Portraying Life* and *Made in Hollywood: Photographs from the John Kobal Foundation* exhibitions. The Chemo Paintings with ArtReach Expressions

Jan. 18–March 21, 2013, Community Gallery

Dorothy Bryan was an artist and philanthropist in Bowling Green, Ohio. During the time she was afflicted with cancer, Bryan created paintings that reflected the different stages of her journey with the disease. Originally the series consisted of 10 paintings, but a formerly unexhibited 11th work will be featured as well. Select artists from past Community Gallery exhibitions were invited to create works inspired by Édouard Manet’s style, his methods or his subjects. Portraying Life in Toledo Photo Exhibition
